Dear Family,

Knowing life was soon to become sad and complicated, before His last supper, Jesus spoke these words of strength and comfort to His disciples.

Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid. (John 14:27)

In this age of coronavirus, it's hard to conceive of peace and an untroubled heart. We are concerned about so many things; our health and the health of family and friends, feelings of loneliness and isolation especially if we live alone, financial concerns for people who are furloughed because of business shutdowns, etc, etc. Put the regular stuff of life on top of all that and we have a recipe for anxiety and fear.

Yet, Jesus promises peace – not as the world gives – but peace that God provides. The peace Jesus talks about isn't that sense of contentment that settles in when life is comfortable. No, this peace is calm in the middle of chaos swirling around us.

God's peace doesn't ignore fear and anxiety. Instead, peace names the fear and allows us to feel it fully. Then, we lean into God's love and the fear loses its power to control us. We're free to respond to tough situations in new and creative ways.

We're doing that as a family of faith. Social distancing doesn't have to mean isolation. We're taking our directories and checking on our friends and elders. We're praying for one another and finding out how to use the computer to gather. We're worshiping together on-line. We're learning to connect our heart spaces even as we have to maintain our physical distances.

Holy Week we will walk with Jesus to the cross. In His suffering and death Jesus shows His complete solidarity with our suffering. Jesus understands betrayal, pain, and death. He completely trusts God as He walks that path to Calvary. He opens His arms and gives Himself totally. And the world weeps thinking it's all over.

It isn't. God loves you! Jesus' victory over death comes three days later. He is raised from the dead and that promise is yours as well. This new life is something we experience NOW, TODAY, not just at the end of life when we transition to new life with God. God is active TODAY in your life bringing new possibility and resurrection from the ashes of defeat.

The gift is we are not alone. God walks with us through every circumstance in our lives. It is that promise that brings peace in the midst of chaos.

As sheltering in place continues, sheltering will become harder. We are NOT ok! Connection, even by phone, is crucial.

Please make every effort to make at least **two calls a day** to different families in our directory. Yes, the directory doesn't include our newest members, but it is all we have. Hopefully, you've saved the information we've included in past newsletters. If you need contact information about a member and don't have it, please call the pastor.

- Please take time to **write cards** to our elders and those you know in pain. Yes, cards in the mail. There is something about receiving something written you can see over and over that fills the heart an lets people know they aren't alone.
- When you leave your home to go to the grocery store, swing by the church and **add something to the food pantry box.** The poor are most vulnerable in this time. The pantry in Waynesboro which also serves Greencastle is fully operational and needs donations.
- **Participate in the activities of the congregation as much as possible.** Gather for worship on Facebook or the Website. Gather for Bible study and prayer via Zoom. Continue your spiritual tithe. Attend Zoom team meetings so the work of the church continues.
- In this time of anxiety and uncertainty, it is tempting to close in, hunker down and ignore everyone else. Jesus tells us they will know we are Christians by our love. For now, love looks like social distancing. It doesn't have to be ignoring our fellows. When you are out in the grocery store, smile and look others in the eye even if they ignore you. It is one way we can share Christ and perhaps make a difference in someone else's day. If they ask how you can be so positive, you can share that Christ gives you hope in the face of uncertainty.
- Being cooped up and stuck together can be especially hard on families. Please be careful with one another. Find creative ways to be with one another in playing and working together. Learn a new skill. Take the time to really connect. If you are having difficulty, please reach out. Call the pastor or reach out to a mental health professional. These are tough times for everyone.

Please look carefully to see how you might participate in the worship of this most holy season.

Palm Sunday, 4/5: Sunday worship will be videotaped and downloaded to Facebook, the Website and YouTube. Create palms with your family so you might experience Jesus' victory ride on a donkey into Jerusalem. We will be sending via email the story of the passion in preparation for the service.

Maundy Thursday, 4/9: Worship will be videotaped and downloaded to Facebook, the Website and YouTube. \Box At 7pm, we will gather for prayer via Zoom, a video conferencing app. Directions to join the prayer service will be emailed.

Good Friday 4/10: The Tenebrae service of light and dark will be videotaped and download to Facebook, the Website and YouTube. To enter the service fully please have ready 8 lighted candles to extinguish or 8 rocks to throw away as we listen to the story of the crucifixion and mourn the death of Jesus. At 7pm, we will gather for prayer via Zoom. Directions to join the prayer service will be emailed.

Easter Sunday, 4/12: Sunday worship will be videotaped and downloaded to Facebook, the Website and YouTube. We will celebrate Easter in the sanctuary the first Sunday we are able to gather as a family of faith.




LOOKING AHEAD

The process is user friendly, however, a separate email from the treasurer and finance secretary will be coming with detailed instructions in case you would find that helpful.

STEWARD THE EARTH, OUR ONLY HOME

"The good leave an inheritance to their children's children." – Proverbs 13:22a

Look at the babies in your congregation and your circle of friends and family. You want them to grow up in the same kind of beautiful, safe, abundant world you did, right? But that's increasingly in doubt.

In the next 50 years, climate change and environmental crises will disrupt patterns of nature and civilization that have developed over millennia. Some scientists even wonder whether the planet will be habitable in 2120.

Australia's horrific wildfires may be just a sample of things to come, along with worsening hurricanes, morefrequent tornadoes, rising sea levels, rapid desertification, and melting glaciers and icebergs. It's not that our world did not already have serious problems with such issues as war, refugees, hunger, species extinction, pollution and extreme weather, but climate change is making them all much worse and much more complicated.

Christians trust in the Almighty, while we also recognize that God calls us to love one another and care for the only home God has given us.

"If we truly believe we've been given responsibility for every living thing on this planet (including each other) as it says in Genesis 1, then it isn't only a matter of caring about climate change," writes evangelical Christian and climate scientist Katherine Hayhoe. "We should be at the front of the line demanding action."

This month we have much to celebrate in the new life we have through our resurrected Lord. We also celebrate spring, seedtime, and Earth Day on April 22. Let us commit ourselves to renewing and protecting the only home we have, the only home we will leave for our children.
