Dear Family,

How are you doing? The uncertainty and chaos that characterize life today can sometimes leave us feeling drained and powerless. What keeps you grounded in these tough times? What helps to bring perspective? How are you taking care of yourself in mind, body and spirit? These are important questions; the stress is overwhelming for many of us.

Life has changed dramatically. The learning curve is steep as we adapt and find new, creative ways to connect. Challenges abound and we're expending a lot of energy trying to navigate. Habits and practices that helped us stay centered in the past may need to be deepened or changed going forward. It's important to stop and take the time for this important inner work. When our physical, emotional and spiritual buckets are depleted, we respond without love and compassion to life and the people around us.

Life for Jesus' disciples isn't easy either. Jesus ascends to heaven and they're left holding the bag. Jesus promises, though, they aren't going forward alone. He makes this promise.

"You will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be My witnesses." Acts 1:8

That day the Holy Spirit comes is called Pentecost. Jesus is clear. You will receive POWER. What power is He talking about? Of course, the power is God's power – love.

Some people are concerned because churches are closed. Trinity is definitely NOT closed. In fact, together in the crucible of suffering, we are learning more about what it means to BE church. We are connecting with each other in new and different ways – making phone calls; sending cards; Zoom meetings for teams, Bible study, prayer and Sunday School; video-taped worship services. We are feeding the needy via our Food Pantry box. We held a car parade to support Dick Miller after Judy's funeral.

The building is temporarily closed to protect the safety of our family and neighbors. Yet, CHURCH isn't closed when our hearts are open to love. What would Jesus have you do to love your neighbor in this time of masks, social distancing and financial insecurity? The Holy Spirit's power makes us witnesses of Jesus to those around us. That's actually our mission: Sharing Christ in Word and Deed. Love is HOW we witness.

So, the renewal team is asking for suggestions on ways our congregation at Trinity can minister to our neighbors during this time of upheaval. COVID19 hasn't changed our mandate to be part of God's work in the world. May the Holy Spirit set you on fire with a passion for Sharing Christ, living in love.

PARK AND PRAY AT TRINITY

Our Trinity Council prayerfully considered various suggestions and recommendations to gathering in person as Franklin County moves to the yellow phase in responding to the Caronavirus. The Council discussed many factors including the higher risk of spreading the virus when larger groups gather in confined spaces for an extended period

of time, the need for disinfecting the space after each service, the number of individuals in our congregation in the "high risk" group, etc.

The decision was made to avoid using the building space and to gather in the parking lot for worship beginning June 14 at 10:00 AM. We will begin slowly to give ourselves time to evaluate the situation and make changes as needed. Our priority is the health and safety of our faith family and neighbors.

How it will look:

- Parking Attendants will wear masks, hand out bulletins and direct you to your parking space.
- For now, PLEASE STAY IN YOUR CAR. Eventually, we plan to move to sitting outside in lawn chairs but not yet.
- All access to the church will be locked except for the side door which will give access to the bathroom.
- All stalls will be taped off except for 1 stall and 1 sink in the men's and women's bathroom. Only 1 person may use the bathroom at a time. The bathrooms will be disinfected before and after each worship by the health team.
- Anyone entering the building on Sunday for any reason will wear a mask.
- The worship team will lead worship from the Portico. The service will be broadcast on your car radio. You will be notified of the frequency via email. It will also be published in the bulletin.
- The first few Sundays will be a Service of the Word with no Communion. The Worship and Music team is exploring ways we can serve Communion safely.
- The worship will also be taped and available on You Tube, the website and Facebook.

A MESSAGE FROM BISHOP EATON

In 1527 the plague returned to Wittenberg, Germany. Two hundred years earlier the plague had swept across Europe killing up to 40% of the population. Understandably, people were anxious and wondered what a safe and faithful response might be. In answer to this, Martin Luther wrote "Whether One May Flee From a Deadly Plague." In it, he emphasized the duty to care for the neighbor, the responsibility of government to protect and provide services to its citizens, a caution about recklessness, and the importance of science, medicine and common sense.

To provide care for the neighbor, Luther recommended that pastors, those in public office, doctors and public servants should remain in the city. Luther himself remained in Wittenberg to care for his people. He recommended that public hospitals be built to accommodate those with the plague. He condemned those who took unnecessary risks that put themselves and others in danger of contagion. Luther also encouraged the use of reason and medicine, writing, "God has created medicines and has provided us with intelligence to guard and take care of the body. ... Use medicine; take potions which can help you; fumigate house, yard, and street; shun persons and places wherever your neighbor does not need your presence" ("Whether One May Flee From a Deadly Plague," 1527).

We are living in the time of the coronavirus. We are also living in the time of social media and constant, relentless news coverage. Many of our people have the same concerns as those in Luther's day. Many of our people are anxious. Luther's counsel, based on Scripture, is still sound. Respect the disease. Do not take unnecessary risks. Provide for the spiritual and physical needs of the neighbor. Make use of medical aid. Care for one another, especially the most vulnerable.

The churchwide organization recommends the following: Wash your hands, stay home when you are sick, wear a mask, consult your medical provider if you have symptoms. Bishops and pastors will provide <u>guidelines</u> for worship and church gatherings.

Luther also reminded his people and us that we should trust God's faithfulness and promises, particularly the promise eternal life. Paul writes: "If we live, we live to the Lord, and if we die, we die to the Lord; so then, whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's" (Romans 14:8).

Covid-19 is receding, though slowly. Much pain lies ahead. Before it's through, the virus will claim more of our friends and loved ones. Many families will suffer economically.

But the virus is also teaching us anew how to be loving neighbors. As Covid-19 abates, we can deepen these lessons and steward our communities to live more closely aligned with God's purposes, to discover life abundant with joy, connection, fulfillment and generosity. With God's help, our congregations and communities can emerge from our Covid-19 cocoon to a more excellent reality, centered in faith, hope and love.
