Dear Family,

Hasn't this been the strangest Lent/Easter/Spring ever? No one could have predicted the upheaval, chaos and trauma of the pandemic. The Lord has some words for us in chaotic times written by one of the prophets.

"The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases, God's mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness." (Lamentations 3: 22-23)

These words of hope are found in the middle of the Book of Lamentations. The book was written to describe the destruction of the temple and subsequent exile of the Jewish people to Babylon. These are words of hope we cling to in the middle of this Pandemic.

Steadfast in Hebrew is a word that means more than unwavering and persistent. It means "womb-like." When we are scared, confused, angry or anxious, God's love envelopes us. We are completely surrounded by love which never ends no matter what. St Paul tell us "...nothing will separate us from the love of God." (Romans 8: 39)

God's love is what keeps us grounded and provides perspective in our current situation. We are bombarded with conflicting information, opinions and perspectives. As followers of Jesus and beloved children of the Most High, our perspective must begin and end with Jesus' command to "love one another as I have loved you."

Your leaders are in conversation about the safest way to begin gathering again. It will be a slow process and we beg your patience. There are many important details to consider. We want to make certain the process is completed well to ensure the safety and health of all of us, especially the most vulnerable in our family. There has not been a decision made as to when we will gather in the sanctuary. It will probably not happen before the end of May.

And so we sit in the crucible of suffering together. It can be a learning time if we let it. What does it mean to BE church when we can't come together in the building? How are we called to personal spiritual practice taking time to deepen our relationship with God? How is knowing God loves us as beloved children making a difference in how we live, the decisions we make, the opinions we hold? How is God transforming us as individuals so that our congregation might see a revival of love and spiritual depth and maturity?

These are deep questions. I invite you to take time to pray and journal with them. When we return to gather in the sanctuary, may we find our congregation transformed. May we recognize Jesus in our worship and in ourselves.

LUTHERAN DISASTER RESPONSE AND COVID –19

Coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19), a new respiratory infection, has been declared a pandemic by the World Health Organization (WHO). So far, more than 2.2 million people around the world have tested positive for COVID-19, and more than 150,000 people have died, according to WHO.

Our response:

Lutheran Disaster Response (LDR) is responding to this pandemic here in the United States and around the world, including:

- Across the United States, LDR is providing support for ELCA World Hunger's Daily Bread grants, which are supporting congregational feeding ministries as they do the critical work of providing those who are in need in their communities with food
- In New Orleans, LDR is aiding the expansion of Bethlehem Lutheran Church's community meal program, which targets the at-risk population who are impacted at this time.
- In Southern California, LDR is supporting Care Connection Network, a social ministry organization, to serve older adults and people who are home bound by delivering food and essential supplies, in collaboration with congregations in the Pacifica Synod.
- In China, we helped provide medical supplies including ventilators, protective face shields, disposable gloves and more, as well as daily necessities such as food.
- In Italy, through the ELCA's companion church, the Chiesa Evangelica Luterana in Italia, LDR is providing Betania Evangelical Hospital in Naples, Italy, with support and medical gear and supplies.
- In Palestine, LDR is working with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jerusalem and the Holy Land to provide food and necessities to families whose livelihoods have been impacted.
- In Sierra Leone, we are supporting the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Sierra Leone so the church can participate in a national response plan with the government.
- LDR is also working with the Lutheran World Federation and the ACT Alliance to support their global responses.

As the situation develops, LDR will continue to be in communication with companions and partners at home and abroad to assess the needs and provide support. We anticipate this public health crisis will escalate in coming weeks and will affect many more people, particularly those who are most vulnerable in our communities. Here in the U.S., we stand ready to work with Lutheran social service organizations affiliated with LDR and with ELCA synods to address the needs of those impacted.

What you can do: Pray

Please pray for our nation and the world as we face uncertainties. May God's healing presence bring peace and hope in this time of need. Pray that God will deliver comfort to those who mourn the loss of loved ones and strength to those who are working diligently to care for affected communities.

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Will COVID-19 help us become better stewards?

Toilet paper. Seriously. Will we ever take lowly "TP" for granted again?

Toilet paper is just one of the countless everyday blessings that the pain of COVID-19 has taught us to savor – along with worshiping beside loved ones, going to work, getting paid, shopping, going to the movies, and on and on. (What's on your list?)

Pain teaches us, focuses us, molds us. Pain strips away pretensions and defenses. Pain shows us what's real, what's true, what's valuable. Pain cleanses our spirit and draws us closer to God.

Easter reminds us that our faith journey is all about death and rebirth. Explaining baptism in *The Small Catechism*, Martin Luther taught that baptism's waters must *daily* drown our old sinful self, so that *daily* we may be born anew. As we walk in God's sanctifying light, parts of us should be dying *daily* and being reborn.

Pain? It serves as midwife in our death and rebirth.

And COVID-19 has given us pain aplenty, far beyond the shortage of bathroom supplies. Many have lost loved ones, jobs, security, healthcare, homes, retirement, wellbeing and relationships.

Pain will be long with us as we slowly inch back towards normalcy. But "normal" will probably look much different than what we've known. A "new normal" is already emerging. Do you sense it? That the pandemic has changed you? Us? Forever?

With the Holy Spirit's help, may COVID-19's pain prune from our lives what needs to die in order for us to be reborn as God's people in this "new normal." May the "new normal" find us better stewards of our lives -- less greedy, less self-focused, less preoccupied with silly things, and more centered in Christ, more loving to our neighbor, more generous, more hopeful and more tolerant.
